My radio, baton, and then 21 magazine pouch. 22 RC: Okay. Radio being the back side, 23 baton a little closer up and then --24 Correct. Other times mags are completely 1 Patrol issues typically one in the chamber 2 and a full maq. 3 Do you recall what condition your firearm 4 was in when you were carrying it at the beginning 5 of yesterday's shift? 6 TH: So, I don't recall exactly. 7 typically will have a full magazine in my firearm. 8 RC: Uh-huh. 9 Plus one in the chamber. TH: 10 RC: Okay. 11 Just for the maximum amount of TH: 12 ammunition in it. 13 RC: Okay. 14 I do recall that the last time that 15 we -- that we qualed towards the end of the year 16 when -- before they, you know, shut it down for --17 for COVID purposes. 18 RC: Uh-huh. 19 I remember I, coming home from the 20 range and I forgot to grab the extra duty round. 21 RC: Uh-huh. 22 And so I just loaded up that TH: 23 seventeen in the magazine and racked it. I don't 24 recall if I, if in that point to now, if I ever 25

topped it off. I very well might have.

is, it's possible you might just be one round 1 short? 2 TH: Correct. From --3 Okay. RC: 4 From what full capacity would be, not 5 just from the seventeen -= 6 RC: Yeah. 7 -- in the magazine. TH: 8 Okay. And that would be your primary RC: 9 magazine, not -- not your other two? 10 Correct. My other two would be --TH: 11 would be topped off all the way to --12 RC: Right. Okay. 13 TH: To seventeen. 14 Okay. And when you started your shift RC: 15 yesterday at 7:00 p.m. did you guys have a 16 briefing? 17 TH: Yes. 18 Anything of particular interest shared 19 at the briefing? 20 Not really, no. It was very -- it TH: 21 was very short. 22 RC: Okay. And what did you do right after 23 the briefing? 24 Right after the briefing, I retrieved TH: 25 my keys for my vehicle and I went out, took my 26

vehicle around and set it up with my equipment.

RC: Okay. 1 TH: And then went in-service. 2 Walk me through that. How do you --RC: 3 what equipment do you put in your black-and-white 4 and how do you set it up and all that stuff? 5 So after I bring my -- my patrol car 6 empty of my own personal equipment, I bring it to 7 the employee parking lot, park it behind it. From 8 there I will take my patrol-issued rifle, set it 9 up cruiser carry. Put it in -- in its -- I 10 totally am blanking out on what it's called. 11 the mount I quess in there. 12 Uh-huh. RC: 13 Or the rifle rack. I don't -- and TH: 14 I'll check my less lethal shotgun that's just 15 already with the vehicle to ensure that it's all 16 less lethal rounds and that it's cruiser carry. 17 I'll then take my gear bag, which on the far right 18 side from -- of my trunk, put it inside the patrol 19 car, typically to the right of -- there's a 20 storage bin in there. 21 RC: Uh-huh. 22 It's about dead center. And then I 23 just move my way left through my car, which will 24 then be my helmet bag, which will go towards 25 closer to the rear so it's like one of the first 26

things I can access. My ballistic vest, the --



the one that I purchased, the rifle plates. And that'll go next to my helmet. I'll grab -- I have a camouflage backpack, which has my gas mask, the helmet shield, and an MRE in it --

RC: Uh-huh.

TH: -- as well as just some minor like first aid stuff. That'll then be set next to it by the traffic cones and I have a bag of snacks usually at any point in there that I will then take and put in the front seat. And I take my seatbelt and clip it through the loop of it so it doesn't fly around.

RC: Uh-huh.

TH: Then I'll go back, grab my jacket, take my jacket and I'll typically will leave it behind the seat belt in the passenger seat so it also doesn't fly off. And then lastly, what I'll do is, is I grab my loose items, which is my citation book, some notepads, gloves, and I pick those up together in a little pile in the far left of my car and I will put them where they need to go; cite books in my door panel. The actual leather bound cite book I'll put behind my passenger seat, my water bottle, for example, will go between the -- the less lethal and my -- my rifle. That's pretty much standard how I'll do it.



RC: Okay. Now, you mentioned your less 1 lethal. Where did you say you kept that? Was 2 that in the back? 3 No. My less lethal I keep in -- in TH: 4 the front --5 In the front. RC: 6 -- adjacent my -- my rifle. TH: 7 So less lethal and rifle in the rack RC: 8 in --9 TH: Correct. 10 RC: -- the front. Okay. You mentioned in 11 the back that you had your ballistic vest and all 12 the other equipment; helmet, those items are in 13 the back, right? 14 TH: Yes. 15 So is that -- are those items 16 accessible from the driver's seat? 17 TH: No. 18 RC: Are they accessible from the back 19 passenger seat? 20 No. TH: 21 Okay. So the only way to get to those RC: 22 is to actually go into the back of the car, open 23 it up to retrieve them? 24 TH: Correct. 25 Okay. And then in the front you have RC: 26 the two items we talked about; less lethal rifle, 27

know, what -- what was -- when you left the 1 station, what was your thought process? 2 So, my initial thought was go find 3 somewhere to park, pull up the report writing, the 4 MRE and then make sure that my reports have all 5 been approved, otherwise that'd be first thing I 6 would go do is write my reports. And if not, then 7 I was intended to go try and pull over a vehicle 8 because I've learned the best way to -- to start 9 off your shift is to go do something first and 10 just kind of get into that right mentality. So 11 that's what my intentions were when I -- when I 12 left the station. 13 RC: Okav. Now, before the call for 14 service that kind of led to us to where we're at 15 now, describe any stops or calls or anything you 16 had throughout your shift, like what was going on 17 throughout the shift before this happened. 18 I don't recall exact details. Those TH: 19 would all be on the -- the call log. 20 RC: IJh-huh. 21 But I do recall several calls for 22 service involving persons who were intoxicated in 23 public, local transients who were -- were causing 24 disturbances. But nothing of -- of any real 25

significance and nothing that resulted in -- in me

arresting anybody, using force, or even taking --

26



having to take a crime report. 1 Okay. And then sometime around 5:00 RC: 2 a.m. this morning, you got a call for service that 3 led us to -- to be here today; is that correct? 4 TH: Correct. 5 Okay. At that moment when you got RC: 6 that call, how were you feeling, what was your 7 mindset? 8 So, I was sitting at a park at the TH: 9 time just kind of relaxing. 10 RC: Uh-huh. 11 I actually was thinking to myself, TH: 12 hey, I only have like two hours left, we're almost 13 there when the call for service came in. 14 actually initially thought, oh, goodness, another 15 It came out as a catalytic conther- --16 converter theft, sorry. And it just kind of more, 17 initially kind of like oh, goodness, it's another 18 one. We keep getting hit hard with these. And 19 then as I started to pull out of the park, they 20 advised that it was in progress and that the 21 reporting party actually could see them actively 22 at another vehicle removing it. 23 So at that point it kind of stepped up, in 24 my mind, of -- of -- of now we need to coordinate 25 getting resources there quickly and efficiently 26

to -- to either block off routes of escape or set



up a perimeter and then work on finding them 1 because we actually have a chance to -- to find 2 these guys in the act. 3 Now, tell me about catalytic converter 4 thefts. What is it and -- and what are some 5 things that go along with it? 6 So, I'm not a vehicle expert by any TH: 7 I know that it's a part of a vehicle and 8 I'm not entirely certain why they steal it; if 9 it's for resale value or I hear that there's 10 platinum I quess in it. 11 RC: Uh-huh. 12 But it maybe -- maybe it's not TH: 13 platinum, maybe it's something. Palladium, I 14 don't -- I don't -- I don't really know. 15 RC: Uh-huh. 16 But it seems we were getting hit very TH: 17 often with the -- with that in the late night, 18 early morning hours in the city of Thousand Oaks. 19 They come in, they cut it from the bottom of the 20 vehicle and they take off. And have you ever spoken with RC: 20 other deputies or heard stories from other 21 deputies about their interactions with these 22 suspects, if -- if they do find them or what 23 transpires during those interactions? 24 Yes. As far as that goes, I've known TH: 25 them to typically flee and usually engage in some 26

sort of vehicle pursuit or flee on foot; however,



usually they -- they are able to quickly get to a 1 freeway or a highway and it's, they either get 2 away or it's not -- it's not safe to continue 3 pursuing them given traffic conditions and they --4 RC: Okay. 5 -- typically get away. 6 RC: Okay. All right. So now what I 7 wanted to do was just kind of ask you to tell me 8 everything that transpired from the time you got 9 this call for service until the moment that you 10 were no longer actively managing the call or 11 engaged in the call, essentially when you step 12 back and -- and were kind of put to the side 13 pending the investigation. Kind of from start to 14 finish, tell me everything there is to know about 15 what happened. 16 Got it. So myself and 9A21, I TH: 17 believe was Deputy Lopez, received the call for 18 service of the catalytic converter theft, which 19 immediately after was turned into a in progress. 20 I was at a park near Pederson and Erbes, I 21 believe on the southwest corner of that 22 intersection when I received the call. I looked 23 at my mapper, saw that it was, I believe off of 24 Radcliffe and Pederson in that area, which is 25 relatively close to where I was at. So I knew I

could be there in a very short amount of time and

26



could potentially be on scene while these suspects were still on scene.

They advised while I was en route, or dispatch advised while I was en route that there were two vehicles involved, described them. And as I was nearing the scene, when I was driving west on Pederson towards Radcliffe, dispatch advised me that the reporting party saw they were going towards Pederson, one after the other.

As I reached the intersection of Radcliffe and Pederson, which is a four-way intersection with stop signs controlling it all, I saw the two vehicles approach north to the intersection and then immediately run the stop sign to make a right turn east onto Pederson.

I con- -- did a U-turn to follow behind them, advised dispatch that I was behind the two vehicles, activated my emergency lights, and both vehicles immediately took off at a high rate of speed.

The vehicle in the front however, took off at more so of a high rate of speed and was almost very quickly out of my view. The second vehicle was still probably going maybe fifty miles per hour but not as fast as the -- as the lead vehicle.

I advised the license plate on the vehicle



- in front of me, the direction of travel and that
 they were failing to yield. They did a right
 turn. I don't recall the -- the name of the
 street. It was Calle something. I advised
 dispatch of that though.
- As soon as they made the -- the right turn,

 I realized that they were -- it wasn't just a

 failure to yield, I was in a pursuit and they were

 actively attempting to flee from me. I activated

 my siren, advised dispatch I was in pursuit, my

 direction of travel.
 - As they drove south on this -- on this street I don't recall the name, the vehicle within a few seconds ended up briefly yielding, stopped all of a sudden.

- As soon as I got out of my vehicle, unholstered my firearm and I saw the vehicle immediately take off again, accelerated away, still southbound. I believe I -- I yelled stop at least one time as they did that.
- I got back in my vehicle, continued

 Continued to advise dispatch where we were going.
- The vehicle suddenly made a right turn.

 initially had thought it was another street. I'm

So I followed them to the right turn and as I made the right turn, they stopped immediately and I found that it was a cul-de-sac so I б immediately stopped behind them. I wasn't able to -- to angle my vehicle in any manner typically for a -- a felony or a high risk traffic stop. I was essentially kind of stuck at the entrance to the -- to the cul-de-sac. I advised dispatch of the felony stop, exited my vehicle, withdrew my holster or my -- sorry, withdrew my firearm, aimed it at the vehicle.

Almost immediately I saw the vehicle accelerate forward and -- and make a sharp left turn back towards me. And I began yelling at the vehicle to stop. As the vehicle very quickly turned towards me, I saw the headlights illuminate and they just accelerated at a high rate of speed directly towards me and I yelled at them to stop and -- and in that moment, I -- I -- I was terrified that they were going to -- they were going to hit me and kill me. And -- and as -- as they accelerated towards me, I -- I discharged my -- my firearm. I'm thinking they were -- they were going to run me over. And I -- I --



initially I thought that I fired three or four times. After reviewing the body cam though, I believe I fired five times.

And I'm sorry. I just need a moment.

It -- it just -- it -- it honestly just happened so fast from thinking that it was going to be a felony stop to jumping out and all of a sudden they accelerated and flipped around towards me.

And it -- it was just so quick they came at me.

And I -- I've seen -- I've seen, you know, videos from other agencies of -- of -- of cops getting hit by cars and it just -- I just know that it -- it could -- it was going to end badly.

After I fired, the vehicle continued to my left and turned left out of the cul-de-sac back onto -- on, I believe it said Rollings is -- is what it was.

The current training that we receive on that is to angle our vehicles off to the side typically like I would angle mine to my -- to the left so if the suspect vehicle was parked like this, I would angle mine out. It allows me to have more cover for myself to protect myself from somebody shooting at me or attempting --attempting to hit me with a -- a vehicle. It gives me more ability to do that.

Instead, I -- I didn't know the street. I don't know if they -- if they did or not. But as we made that turn, it was just sudden, suddenly a stop and we found ourselves in a cul-de-sac that I was right -- essentially right behind them. I was in line with them.

so I -- I - I didn't have the chance to -to reposition my vehicle safely as well as to let
dispatch know where I was at and that we were
having a felony stop. So I elected just to get
out of my car right then and there 'cause I know
if I stay in the car, I -- it's more risk for me
getting killed in my car. I have nowhere to go.
